

He is an editor of the IEEE Transactions on Power Systems, the IEEE Transactions on Smart Grid, an associate editor of Journal of Energy Engineering, an editor of the IEEE PES Letters and an editorial board member of Applied Energy.

She holds a Ph.D. in Environmental and Natural Resource Economics (Yale University). Previously, she served as a consultant for the Prototype Carbon Finance Unit at the World Bank and on several water projects in China with the World Bank Institute.

Professor Nagle is the co-author of casebooks on "The Practice and Policy of Environmental Law, "Property Law," and "The Law of Biodiversity and Ecosystem Management.
